HISTORICAL PEDIGREE, 1380 TO 1641 A.D., OF MAC CARTHYS, LORDS OF MUSKERRY, CO. CORK.

From the parent stem of MACCARTHY MOR, Princes of Desmond, "Kings of Cork," whose Pedigree goes back to remote antiquity, proceeded DERMOT, 2nd son (born 1310), of CORMAC MACCARTHY MOR, Prince of Desmond, and he became first lord of Muskerry.

This DERMOT's grandson was
TEIGE VIth lord of Muskerry

TEIGE M'CORMAC MACCARTHY, VIth lord of Mus-
kerry, b. 1380; succ. 1418; d. 1448.

DERMOT M'C. MACCARTHY, who had a son, Teige

VIIIth lord.

CORMAC M'TEIGE MACCARTHY, surnamed Laidir,
IXth lord, b. 1411; succ. 1449; d. 1494; bur. Kilerca.
Founded in 1465 (or 1478) Franciscan Abbey of
Kilerca and 5 other Churches, and about 1450 the
Abbey of Ballymacdadan. Built Castles Blarney,
Kilerca, and Carrignamuck. Authorised with
Finghin MacCarthy Reagh, by Henry VII., to
receive homage of Irish Chiefs. Killed by brother
Eoghan, at Carrignamuck, 1494.

MARY, dau. of Edmund
Fitzmaurice, lord
of Kerry.

DERMOT M'TEIGE MACCARTHY, ancestor of Mac-
Carthy of Drishane. Built Castle of Carrigaphoca,
and in 1436 that of Drishane. Killed, 1451.

EOGHAN (OWEN) M'TEIGE MACCARTHY, at Carrig-
namuck, 1451, and ancestor of the Rathduane
family. Set aside for murder from succession to
lordship.

ELLEN, wife of DERMOT-an-Dona MacCarthy Reagh,
Prince of Carbery, who succ. 1452.
had issue.

CORMAC OGE M'CORMAC MACCARTHY, XIth lord,
b. 1447; succ. 1494; d. 1537; bur. Kilerca. In
1521, with aid of brother-in-law, Donal M'C.
Reagh of Carbery, defeated James, 11th Earl of
Desmond, at battle of Mourne Abbey. Attended
Parli. in 1525 as lord of Muskerry.

CATHERINE, 2nd
dau. of John
Lord Barry and
Visc. Butevant
(called "1st wife"
by Lodge.)

..... dau. the 1st wife of Donal
M'Finghin MacCarthy Reagh,
Prince, for 26 years, of Carbery,
who assisted Cormac at battle of
Mourne Abbey.
had issue.

TEIGE M'CORMAC OGE MACCARTHY, XIIth lord,
b. 1472; succ. 1537; d. 1595; bur. Kilerca.
In 1542 submitted to the Crown by indenture of
allegiance. Repaired and beautified Macroom
castle, where he died.

JULIA, dau. of Donal M'Fa.
MacCarthy Reagh, pr. of
Carbery, by his 2nd wife,
Ellen, eldest dau. of
Gerald, 8th E. of Kildare,
Lord Deputy, 1478, and
Lord Lt., 1496-1513. She
died, 1592.

CALLAGHAN M'C OGE
MACCARTHY, XIIIth
lord, for about a
month.

DERMOT M'C. OGE
MACCARTHY, who
in 1545 obtained from
Henry VIII. a lease
of the preceptory and
lands of Mourne
Abbey, of which he
had been preceptor.
(Fiant. 461. 37 Hen.
8.)

GYLES, JULIA, or CICELY, thrice married:—
(1) Gerald Fitzmaurice, 15th lord of Kerry.
(2) Cormac-na-Haoinne MacCarthy Reagh, pr. of
Carbery, whose son was Donal-na-Pipi, also
prince.
(3) Edmund Butler, Lord Dunboyne, who had issue
3 sons and 2 dau., elder of whom, Eleanor, m.
Thomas, 12th Earl of Desmond.

ELLEN (or JOAN), wife of
James Leaghe, of Barretta.
had issue.
(See XIVth lord.)

MARY, wife, 1stly of James, 13th
Earl of Desmond, by whom she
had issue; and 2ndly of Donal
O'Sullivan Mor.

(1.) SIR DERMOT M'TEIGE MACCARTHY, XIIIth = ELLEN, dau. of Sir
lord, b. 1501; succ. 1565; d. 1570; bur. Kilerca;
immediate ancestor of the families of Inshirahell,
Aglishe and Carrignavar, and of Earls Clancarty. In
1563 or 1565, defeated in battle his father-in-law
(then 80 years old), who was murdered by his Guard.
Commissioned 25 Apr., 1567, to execute martial law
in Muskerry; on 28 June same year received, with
his tenant Cormac, a pardon of all previous offences.

(2.) SIR CORMAC M'TEIGE MACCARTHY, XIVth = ELLEN, dau. of
lord, b.; succ. 1570; d. 1573; bur.; will dat.
16 June, 1581; proved 9th Oct. same year, Dio.
Cork; immediate ancestor of families of Courtbrack
and Mourne (or Na-Mona), Balla, Cloghroe and
Castlemore. Living as tenant at Carrignamuck in
1567. Sheriff Co. Cork, 1573; and after, then lord
at Blarney. Recd. large grants of land from Queen
in Cos. Cork, Tip., & Wat. in 1577; surrendered to
Queen lands of Muskerry, and obtained re-grant
to himself in 1578.
By his tenant, Donal-na-County, defeated, in 1580, Sir
James, bro. of rebel E. of Desmond at Agharudderra,
between Carrignamuck and Carrigrohilly Castles.

James Leaghe
and Sir Cormac's
first cousin. Di-
vorced as being
already wife of
James Fitzmaurice
Fitzgerald.

(3.) DANIEL M'TEIGE MACCAR-
THY, called Donal-na-County.
Living as tenant at Carrignamuck,
1573. Mortally wounded at Battle
of Agharudderra, and died of the
wounds in 1581, leaving his next
brother then as tenant.

ELLEN, dau. of
Teige M'Dermot
MacCarthy, of
Coshmange, and
relict of Donal
MacCarthy, of Don-
nagail.
Issue:—Three sons serving in Spain:—Dermot; Teige (Captain, married to
dau. of Donal MacSweeney aforesaid*), and Donogh; and a dau., wife of
James FitzEdmond Oge Fitzgerald, of Imokilly.

(4.) SIR CALLAGHAN M'TEIGE = ELLEN, dau. of = SHILLIE (Julia) dau.
lord, b. 1583-4. Resigned lordship for year
1583-4. Resigned lordship to
nephew, Cormac, on a composition
for lands; immediate ancestor of
family of Carrignamuck. Living
at Castlemore in 1573 and 1577,
and at Carrignamuck on 31 Dec.,
1584, and still there in 1601-3.

James, 15th Earl.

(3.) ELINOR, wife
(mar. 1593), of
Dermot-na-Glac
MacCarthy, lord
of Glenmacroom.
Had issue.

(1.) SIR CORMAC M'DERMOT MACCARTHY, XVIIth = MARY, 2nd dau. of
lord, b. 1532; succ. 1584; d. 1616; bur. Kilerca,
being the last lord buried there (Smith). Conformed
to the Protestant religion. Sat in Parli. 1587 as
Baron of Blarney. Surrendered to Queen lands of
Muskerry, and obtained a re-grant to himself
absolutely, 1589. Repeated this policy under K.
James (23 Feb., 11th Jac. I.), in order to secure
succession to his son. Assisted the royal forces
before Kinsale against the Spaniards, 1601.

(2.) TEIGE M'DERMOT
MACCARTHY, of In-
shirahell (now
Crookstown), and
founder of the Mac-
Carthy family there.
Summoned to Cork
as a suspected person,
28 July, 1601.

of Donogh Oge
MacCarthy

the family of Courtbrack and
Mourne. Obtained under father's
will Mourne, half of Cloghroe,
and other lands. Living at Clogh-
roe in 1603. Inquisition p.m.,
1606.

ELLEN, dau. of
Donal M'Owen
MacCarthy, captain
of galleasses,
and chief warder
of Blarney Castle
under Sir Cor-
mac.

GRAINA, wife of
Owen M'Teige
MacCarthy, of Drishane.
Had issue.

(2.) CORMAC OGE M'CORMAC MAC-
CARTHY, under age in 1583. Ob-
tained under father's will lands in
Carbery, and in co.'s Tipp. and
Wat., and half Cloghroe, and other
lands, and the reversion of the
lordship; which last was defeated
by Patents of K. James I.; d. circ.
1614; described then as "of Kil-
crea," in Patent giving wardship
of son to Michael Newly (8 Dec.
11th Jac. I.)

GRAINA, dau. of
Finin M'Owen
MacCarthy, of
Carbery, and
relict of Barry
Oge, of Butte-
vant.

(3.) TEIGE M'COR- = ELLEN,
MACCARTHY, of Bal-
la, founder of family
there. Living
there 1603.

Three daus., Gilly,
Mary, and Ellen,
wife of Owen,
son of Sir Donal
O'Sullivan, of
Bear and Bantay.

(1.) CORMAC M'CALLAGHAN = ELLEN,
MACCARTHY, of Carrig-
namuck. Forfeiting pro-
prietor, 1641. Property
restored to Earl Clancarty,
1660, who leased it to
Cormac's son, Teige; (will
dat. 9 Sept., 1681; proved
25 May, 1685, dis. Cloyne.)
(Teige left 5 sons and some
daus.)

(2.) TEIGE M'CAL-
LAGHAN MAC-
CARTHY, of Old
Castle, Muskerry.
Forfeiting proprie-
tor, 1641. Property
restored to Earl
Clancarty.

(1.) SIR CORMAC OGE M'CORMAC MACCARTHY, = MARGARET,
XVIIIth lord, b. 1594; succ. 1616; d. 1640 in
London. Educated at Oxford. Surrendered and
obtained re-grant of Muskerry lands (9 July, 15
Jac. I.); and soon after (24 Feb. 17 Jac. I.) obtained
grant of livery of certain of all lordships, manors, and
lands enjoyed by his father. Created 15 Nov., 1628,
Lord MacCarthy, Baron of Blarney, and 1st Viscount
MacCarthy of Muskerry.
had issue

(2.) DONAL M'CORMAC =
MACCARTHY, of Car-
rignavar, and builder
of the castle, and
founder of the family
there.
had issue

(3.) TEIGE M'CORMAC =
MACCARTHY, of
Aglishe, and founder
of the family there.
Mentioned in Pac.
Hib., 614, as a dan-
gerous person.
had issue

JULIA, wife 1stly of
David Barry,
Visc. Butevant
(his first wife)
2ndly of Sir Roger
O'Shaughnessy,
knt.
had issue

DERMOT M'TEIGE
MACCARTHY, of In-
shirahell, &c. Forfeit-
ing proprietor, 1641.
Inshirahell, Castle-
more, &c., were
granted by patent to
T. Crooke and John
Bayly.

CORMAC M'DONOGH =
MACCARTHY, "Maister-
na-mona," b.
1593. Transferred
lands of Mourne, &c.
to Rd. Hawes in 1636,
who disposed thereof
by will, 1654.
had issue

dau. of Donal
O'Donovan, of Ra-
hine, and wife Joanna,
dau. of Sir Owen
MacCarthy Reagh.

CHARLES M'CORMAC OGE M'CORMAC M'TEIGE =
MACCARTHY, thus fully named in the Patent of
11th Jac. I. also, of Castlemore, Cloghroe, &c.
["Charles Oge" is mentioned as of Castlemore in
1640, in will of cousin Charles M'Teige MacC., of
Balla. The same was forfeiting proprietor of
Castlemore, &c., in 1641.]
had issue

CHARLES M'TEIGE = JOAN, 2nd dau. of
MACCARTHY, of
Balla. Will dated
6 October, 1640;
proved Dio. Cork
and Ross. Died
s.p.

NOTE BY THE COMPILER.—The above Pedigree between 1380 and 1641 cannot be regarded as exhaustive; but, as far as it goes, it appears consistent with public records and other authorities. In it are put together the main facts as known to the compiler up to date, in regard to each individual. The order of succession of the lords of Muskerry is given according to the Lambeth MSS., as quoted in the Appx. to the work of Daniel MacCarthy (Glas.), "The MacCarthys of Glenmacroom," and this author's numerous extracts from those MSS. are also relied on, the MSS. not being directly consulted. Other authorities used are:—Sir W. Betham's MSS. in Br. Mus. Lib. (consulted direct); Lodge's Peerage, by Archib. Ed. 1789; O'Hart's Irish Pedigrees, which book, so far as it extends, agrees here fairly well with official documents; and finally Wills, and the Down Survey (1656), and the Fians of Hen. VIII. and Eliz. in Pub. Rec. Off., Dublin. These last afford a well-stocked hunting ground for a genealogist; for example, the entry of a pardon, A.D., 1603, to Callaghan M'Teige M'Cormac MacCarthy, of Carrignamuck, gent., and Shillie ny Teige M'Owen, his wife, supplies a date, a man's name, and those of his father and grandfather, his residence and status, with the names of his wife and of her father and grandfather.
